



Affirmation of Faith | Nicene Creed

<i>Leader:</i>	Called by Emperor Constantine to deal with Arianism (a heresy that denied the eternal nature of God the Son), this creed was prepared by an assembly of 300 bishops who met at Nicaea (modern day Isnik in Persia) on May 20, 325 to state clearly the sonship, eternal nature and "one substance" quality of the Son in his relationship to God the Father. Next to the Apostle's Creed, it is one of the more significant creeds in the Christian Faith. Christians, what do you believe?
All:	We believe in one God, the Father almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all things visible and invisible.
	 And in one Lord Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, begotten from the Father before all ages, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made; of the same essence as the Father. Through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven; he became incarnate by the Holy Spirit and the virgin Mary, and was made human. He was crucified for us under Pontius Pilate; he suffered and was buried. The third day he rose again, according to the Scriptures. He ascended to heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again with glory to judge the living and the dead. His kingdom will never end.
	And we believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life.

He proceeds from the Father and the Son, and with the Father and the Son is worshiped and glorified. He spoke through the prophets. We believe in one holy catholic* and apostolic church. We affirm one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look forward to the resurrection of the dead, and to life in the world to come. Amen.



Scripture Reading | Luke 24:13-35 | p. 885

¹³ That very day two of them were going to a village named Emmaus, about seven miles from Jerusalem, ¹⁴ and they were talking with each other about all these things that had happened. ¹⁵While they were talking and discussing together, Jesus himself drew near and went with them. ¹⁶But their eyes were kept from recognizing him. ¹⁷And he said to them, "What is this conversation that you are holding with each other as you walk?" And they stood still, looking sad. ¹⁸Then one of them, named Cleopas, answered him, "Are you the only visitor to Jerusalem who does not know the things that have happened there in these days?" ¹⁹And he said to them, "What things?" And they said to him, "Concerning Jesus of Nazareth, a man who was a prophet mighty in deed and word before God and all the people, ²⁰ and how our chief priests and rulers delivered him up to be condemned to death, and crucified him. ²¹But we had hoped that he was the one to redeem Israel. Yes, and besides all this, it is now the third day since these things happened. ²² Moreover, some women of our company amazed us. They were at the tomb early in the morning, ²³ and when they did not find his body, they came back saying that they had even seen a vision of angels, who said that he was alive. ²⁴ Some of those who were with us went to the tomb and found it just as the women had said, but him they did not see." ²⁵ And he said to them, "O foolish ones, and slow of heart to believe all that the prophets have spoken! ²⁶ Was it not necessary that the Christ should suffer these things and enter into his glory?" ²⁷ And beginning with Moses and all the Prophets, he interpreted to them in all the Scriptures the things concerning himself.

²⁸ So they drew near to the village to which they were going. He acted as if he were going farther, ²⁹ but they urged him strongly, saying, "Stay with us, for it is toward evening and the day is now far spent." So he went in to stay with them. ³⁰ When he was at table with them, he took the bread and blessed and broke it and gave it to them. ³¹ And their eyes were opened, and they recognized him. And he vanished from their sight. ³² They said to each other, "Did not our hearts burn within us while he talked to us on the road, while he opened to us the Scriptures?" ³³ And they rose that same hour and returned to Jerusalem. And they found the eleven and those who were with them gathered together, ³⁴ saying, "The Lord has risen indeed, and has appeared to Simon!" ³⁵ Then they told what had happened on the road, and how he was known to them in the breaking of the bread.

Sermon | "Did Not Our Hearts Burn Within Us": Rekindling First Love Passion Rev. Dr. Curt McDaniel

Sermon Notes

Vince Lombardi is still regarded by the most knowledgeable commentators as the most formidable coach and competitor the game of football has ever seen. What made Coach Lombardi stand out in his day and ours was his passion for the game and for winning. Bart Starr, HOF quarterback, states this explicitly:

To win, you have to have a certain amount of mental toughness. Coach Lombardi gave me that. He taught me that you must have a flaming desire to win. It's got to dominate all your waking hours. It can't ever wane. It's got to glow in you all the time. ¹

That "glow in you all the time" is what many people call **passion**. It's an all-consuming fervor, obsession, ardor, zeal, and pursuit of something that a person deems to be one of the most valuable quests that anyone could ever undertake. You get a glimpse of this in the two disciples on the road to Emmaus after an unrecognized Jesus spent time with them, as "beginning with Moses and all the Prophets, he interpreted to them in all the Scriptures the things concerning himself" (Luke 24:27). Then, after going into a home in the nearby village and enjoying a meal with them, their eyes were opened to see Jesus' resurrected identity, causing them to say, "Did not our hearts burn within us while he talked to us on the road, while he opened to us the Scriptures?" (24:32). This burning, this flame, this "soul blaze", is what is called passion. It comes from a mighty longing for God, and **it finds all its fulfillment in the Lord Jesus Christ**,

Come near to the holy men and women of the past, and you will soon feel the heat of their desire after God. They mourned for Him; they prayed and wrestled and sought for Him day and night, in season and out, and when they found Him the finding was all the sweeter for the long seeking...I want deliberately to encourage this mighty longing after God. The lack of it has brought us to our present low estate. The stiff and wooden quality about our religious lives is a result of our lack of a holy desire. Complacency is a deadly foe of all spiritual growth. Acute desire must be present or there will be no manifestation of Christ to His people. He waits to be wanted. Too bad that with many of us He waits so long, so very long, in vain.²

Tozer's reflection motivates me to study the holy saints of God in the past to see how they pursued God and how that pursuit finds its fulfillment in Jesus. It is important to remember that the pursuit of God and the passion for Him is not a "cookie cutter" formula or a "magic wand" prescription that will instantly bring fervor and spark to one's inner life. God's infinite nature and manifold character are eternally immense and gloriously spectacular, so how can you pursue Him with persistent intentionality and with determined devotion? **Where do you start?** I have been greatly helped by the writings of the Rev. Edward Pearse (1633-1673), preacher and pastor of St. Margaret's, Westminster (adjacent to Westminster Abbey in London) from 1657-1660. Because of his nonconformist views, this beloved Puritan herald was ejected from this parish by the Church of England in 1660, yet he continued to preach and to write until tuberculosis claimed his life when he was 40. He wrote a couple of gems that I find so helpful. One is called *The Best Match: The Soul's Espousal to Christ, and this one, A Beam of Divine Glory: The Unchangeableness of God Opened, Vindicated, and Improved* (published in 1674 shortly after his death), states:

The unchangeableness of God calls aloud upon us all to choose Him for our God and portion, and to take up the rest and happiness of our souls in Him and not in the creatures. The truth is, to choose God for our God and portion, and to take up our rest and happiness in Him, is what every discovery of God, in one or another excellency or perfection of His, requires and calls for at our hands. Does He reveal Himself to be a holy God? This calls upon us to choose Him for our God and portion, and to get an interest in His holiness. Does God reveal Himself to be a gracious God, a God of grace and love? This calls upon us to choose Him for our God and portion, and to get an interest in His love...God is such an infinite ocean of goodness, sweetness, and blessedness as He is, yet that which crowns all is His unchangeableness in all; without this, the whole of God could not make us happy.³

What I see Pearse saying motivates me to deepen my passion for God upon a foundation that rests in God's unchangeable nature. Upon this foundation, I study Scripture, looking for those attributes of God that surface in the narrative, prophetic, poetic, and epistolary genres of a text. When they appear explaining the biblical-redemptive story and its fulfillment in Christ, I am stoked to ponder the wonder of God in it all. The beauty of this approach is that when you look at many biblical characters, you see different attributes of God pursued by each character, and all these attributes in one way or another point to Jesus, our Immanuel:

- Enoch, a passion for pleasing God: "Enoch walked with God, and he was not, for God took him." Jude wrote that Enoch's passion prophesied a coming judgment from God against all ungodliness (14-15), fueled by a desire to please God in his daily life (Hebrews 11:5). Jesus sought to please His heavenly Father.
- Noah, a passion for righteousness: "Noah was a righteous man, blameless in his generation. Noah walked with God" (Genesis 6:9). Hebrews 11:7 tells us Noah's passion "constructed an ark in reverent fear." By this, he condemned the world and became an heir of the righteousness that comes by faith." Jesus affirmed Noah.
- Abraham, a passion for believing God: "And he believed the Lord, and He counted it to him as righteousness" (Genesis 15:6, quoted in Romans 4:3, Galatians 3:6, and James 2:23). This faith enabled him to "look forward to the city that has foundations, whose designer and builder was God" (Hebrews 11:10), a trust that was tested and refined in the offering of Isaac (Genesis 22, Hebrews 11:17), commended by God, and picturing the sacrifice of Christ on that same mount centuries later (Mt. Moriah is the Temple Mount).
- Jacob, a passion for God's blessing: a relentless wrestling with God, determining not to let go of Him (the preincarnate Christ in the OT, a Christophany in Genesis 32:22ff) until He blesses him. Note the timing of this event and its relationship to Jacob's preparation to meet Esau (32:1-20) and later the reunion with his brother (33). Obviously, many years had passed, but you see in Genesis 33 an intersection of divine grace (personified in Jacob) with divine mercy (personified in Esau), with all the beauty that results from it!
- Joseph, a passion for God's providence: Through his enslavement, imprisonment, and abandonment (Genesis 39-41), God instilled in Joseph a passion for His sovereign orchestration of events: "So it was not you who sent me here, but God" (Genesis 45:8a), and "You meant evil against me, but God meant it for good" (50:20). Jesus understood His mission in the timing and providence of God.
- Moses, a passion for God's glory: Through the burning bush experience (Exodus 3-4) and other accounts, "The Lord used to speak to Moses' face to face, as man speaks to his friend" (33:11), "and the skin of his face shone because he had been talking with God" (34:29). See Paul's reflection in 2 Corinthians 3:7-18, and the thoughts of the

writer to the Hebrews (11:23-29). Jesus reflected the Father's glory (John 1:14).

- David, a passion for God's triumph: While he is known as the warring king and the "giant slayer," David was ultimately obsessed with God's honor and triumph (Psalm 2), showing him to be "a man after God's own heart" (I Samuel 13:14, Acts 13:22). Note Psalm 2:12 and how it points to Christ's triumph and hope.
- Isaiah, a passion for God's holiness: In a time of national mourning (King Uzziah's death), Isaiah sees a vision of God's holiness (Isaiah 6), provoking repentance (6:5), receiving forgiveness (6:7), and a call to go and to declare a message from God to the nation, filled with prophecies of the Messiah. Jesus is holy.
- Daniel, a passion for God's law: During Darius' reign, this king was trapped by some satraps and officials to sentence those like Daniel who placed God's law above the law of the land (6:3-5). Through his allegiance to God's law and his trust in God's protection, Daniel was delivered from the lions (6:16-28). Jesus upheld God's law in his earthly ministry and fulfilled every feature of it.
- Habakkuk, a passion for God's sovereignty: In a time of great lawlessness and violence where he questioned God's silence and supremacy (Habakkuk 1-2), God showed the prophet His dominion (1:5ff, 2:1-4, 14) and holiness (2:2), moving him to deep worship and trust (chapter 3). Note 2:4: "by faith" (in Jesus), a verse quoted several times by Paul in the NT (Romans 1:17, Galatians 3:11, Hebrews 10:38).
- Peter, a passion for Jesus' identity: In a pivotal moment, he said to Jesus, "You are the Christ, the Son of the living God" (Matthew 16:16). This enabled him later to get out of the boat and walk a few steps toward Christ, and this confession would mold him to be one of the two greatest preachers and leaders in the early church. You cannot read Acts 2-12 (then his testimony in 15:7-11) without sensing a deep fire for Jesus' identity.
- Paul, a passion for God's gospel, power, and intimacy through suffering: Many facets of passion are seen in Paul. He was "not ashamed of the gospel, for it is the power of God for salvation to everyone who believes, to the Jew first and also to the Greek. For in it the righteousness of God is revealed from faith to faith, as it is written, 'The righteous shall live by faith''' (Romans 1:16-17). Why was he not

ashamed? Because of his relentless pursuit of the Son of God, who pursued him on the road to Damascus, "that I may know him and the power of his resurrection, and may share his sufferings, becoming like him in his death" (Philippians 3:10). Through his experiences, calling, ministry, and imprisonment, we possess some of the greatest writings in the history of civilization: the prison and pastoral epistles in the NT.

• John, a passion for God's light and love: This "disciple whom Jesus loved" (John 13:23) was one of the 2 closest eyewitnesses to Jesus' life and work, and his relationship with Christ, both in his youth with Jesus' earthly ministry and later his reflection as an apostle for nearly 60 years—where he preached and wrote about Jesus' revelatory and redemptive mission—has resulted in one of the greatest apologetic presentations of the Lord Jesus Christ ever given (the Gospel according to John), 3 letters showing us how God's light and love are best demonstrated (the Johannine Epistles), and the most comforting treatise for Christians in human history: The Apocalypse (Revelation). Don't get overwhelmed with Revelation's meaning; instead, get its message: "Our Side Wins!" This can give you great hope.

Personal Application: We can quickly lose passion and fervor for God either when I) we get fixated and prioritized engaging the Scriptures just to gain more knowledge and information (remember I Corinthians 8:Ib); and/or 2) we fail to see and pursue the character of God and His glorious attributes magnificently displayed in the biblical text, **driving us to personal worship and adoration of Jesus Christ, the One who fulfills all of them in His being and accomplishment.** Seeing God in the text and pursuing Christ as its fulfillment marks the quest of the worshiper who says, "As a deer pants for flowing streams, so pants my soul for you, O God. My soul thirsts for God, for the living God. When shall I come and appear before God?" (Psalm 42:1-2).

Reflection:

The two disciples on the road to Emmaus had a most profitable journey. Their companion and teacher was the best of tutors; the interpreter one of a thousand, in whom are hid all the treasures of wisdom and knowledge. The Lord Jesus condescended to become a preacher of the gospel, and He was not ashamed to exercise His calling before an audience of two persons, neither does He now refuse

to become the teacher of even one. Let us court the company of so excellent an Instructor, for till He is made unto us wisdom we shall never be wise unto salvation. $^{\rm 4}$

Study and Discussion Questions:

- What are some of the things in life that fill you with passion? Give an explanation. What does this particular pursuit do to you and produce in you?
- 2. Reexamine the account in Luke 24:13-35, and note especially verses 16, 31, and 35. How does this help you understand passion?
- 3. Review the quote by the Puritan preacher Edward Pearse, and discuss his insight into obtaining happiness. How does this help you read Scripture?
- 4. Review the various biblical characters referenced in the sermon, and their respective passions. Which one(s) resonate(s) with you right now? How can this help you engage Scripture on a "passion level?"


